



Art week starting 15th June 2020



Piet Mandrian (1872 – 1944) was a Dutch artist best known for his **abstract paintings**. Art that is abstract does not show things that are recognisable such as people, objects or landscapes. Instead artists use colours, shapes and textures to achieve their effect. You can find out more about him on the Tate Kids website <u>here</u>.








Your art this week is to create a picture in the style of Mondrian.


We are going to use his 'Composition II in red, Blue and Yellow' as inspiration.

You can do this either with coloured pencils, colouring pens, paints or you could create a collage using different colours you can find in magazines, if you are allowed to cut them up.



Follow these steps to create your Mondrian picture: First, draw out your grid inside a frame, trying to copy the picture.

Don't worry if you don't get it quite right.



Then, decide which parts of the grid you want to fill with colour. You can use coloured pencils, colouring pens, paint or use pieces of different coloured paper cut out from magazines. Remember you don't have to fill in each square / rectangle.

Challenge:

Can you find a different painting by Mondrian and try to create that?

Remember to take a picture of it and send it back in on Google Classrooms. We want to see your 'Mondrian' creations. Now you are abstract artists. Well done.
